
States with Anti-Bullying Legislation (46)


States with No Anti-Bullying Legislation (4, DC)












Effects of Bullying on School Climate





- Students may feel insecure and not like school as well
- Students may perceive lack of control/caring

Olweus Bullying Prevention Program, 201

Bullying Prevention and Intervention is For:

- Those who are bullied
- Those who bully others
- Those who are "bystanders" witnessing purposeful aggression
- The "workplace" or school environment is impacted by unaddressed bullying behavior, making it toxic for students and adults alike.

Ineffective Interventions

- Simple, short-term solutions
- "Program du jour approaches"
- Group treatment for children who bully
- Self-esteem enhancement for children who bully
- Zero tolerance policies for bullying/ punitive approach
- Mediation/conflict resolution to resolve bullying issues

- Level 2 Program (US Dept. of Education)

Olweus Bullying Prevention Program, 2010

OBPP is . . .

- designed for ALL students
- preventive AND responsive
- focused on changing norms and restructuring the school setting
- research-based
- NOT time-limited: requires systematic efforts over time

Goals of OBPP




- To reduce existing bullying problems among students
- To prevent the development of new bullying problems
- To achieve better peer relations at school

Recognition of the *Olweus Bullying Prevention Program*

- Blueprints Model Program (Center for the Study and Prevention of Violence)
- Effective Program (OJJDP)
- Level 2 Program (U.S. Department of Education)

Program Principles

- Adults in school need to show warmth, positive interest, and involvement.
- 2. Set firm limits for unacceptable behavior.
- 3. Consistently use nonphysical, nonhostile negative consequences when rules are broken.
- 4. Adults in the school should act as authorities and positive role models.



School-Level Components

- 1. Establish a Bullying Prevention Coordinating Committee (BPCC)
- 2. Conduct committee and staff trainings (Admin, Educators, Bus Drivers, Lunch Staff, Playground Supervisors, EVERYONE)
- 3. Administer the Olweus Bullying Questionnaire
- 4. Hold staff discussion groups
- 5. Introduce the school rules about bullying
- Review and refine the school's supervisory system
- 7. Hold a school kick-off event to launch the program
 - 8. Involve parents

Classroom-Level Components

- Post and enforce school wide rules against bullying
- · Hold regular class meetings
- · Hold meetings with students' parents



Individual-Level Components

- Supervise students' activities
- Ensure that all staff members intervene on the spot when bullying occurs
- Hold meetings with students involved in bullying
- Develop individual intervention plans for involved students



Community-Level Components

- Involve community members and parents on the BPCC
- Develop partnerships with community members to support your program
- Help spread anti-bullying messages and principles of best practice throughout the community

Take-Home Message

- It is possible to reduce bullying.
- It requires a *team* effort.
- It requires a long-term commitment.

Tennessee Initiatives ... the journey began

- 2001–2006 First partnership Tennessee Department of Education, School Safety and Learning Supports, The University of Tennessee and STARS Nashville began providing statewide "Best Practices in Bullying Prevention" sessions for school teams. Over 250 schools trained involving over 2000 school and community partners.
- 2004 First pilot Implementation of Olweus Training in 19 urban, suburban, and rural schools.
 Public and Private Funding.
- 2006 2011 First Annual Olweus Bullying Prevention Program **ORPP Trainer Certification Courses.**Currently 57 trainers across all regions of the State.
 (Over 150 sites trained, including after school and community-based programs)
- 2008-2011 From Policy to Best Practices Sessions for School implementing Bullying Programs for School Leaders - Spring 2011 (Addressing Revisions in policy, legal issues and Best Practices.)
- > 2008 2011 First of 6 Safe Dates Training of Implementers
- 2009 Established partnership with Hazelden for bookstore on STARS Nashville website, 2010
 Lifelines Suicide Prevention and Postvention Certification Training
- March 2012- Fifth Olweus Trainer Certification Course

Rodes College, Evergreen Presbyterian Church, and The Center for Safe and Drug Free Schools helped make Snowden's program possible!!!







It's February 2011 and I am sitting in a state-wide Safe Schools meeting in Ames, Iowa
We drove up in a blizzard....

As part of the Safe and Supportive Schools grant...

Iowa Department of Education invited participating districts to bring a small contingent of school and community members to Iowa State University in Ames for a conference on the grant, and to hear Kevin Jennings, Assistant Deputy Secretary for the Office of Safe and Drug Free Schools speak on bullying and safe schools...

So I am listening to Kevin Jennings and I start to brainstorm...you know how that goes....And I am thinking about that statement, the world is your bystander, and I start to scribble a note the YMCA community partner who has come to Ames with us...

I write..... "I think I should train a "community" Olweus Team....more notes and possible team members followed

Remember the book and disaster movie...with Clooney and Walberg? Isn't that what you think of with "Perfect Storm"?

STORM

A perfect storm is an expression that describes an event where a rare combination of circumstances will aggravate a situation drastically.

And that idea of a perfect storm started the idea for a "**new"** perfect storm....

At that meeting in Ames, that small contingent from Davenport decided to seek out a local marketing company and train a community anti bullying committee and have an anti bullying community campaign at the beginning of the school year.

An new kind of perfect storm

Although bullying and its effects are a disastrous situation, we saw what was happening in the State of Iowa and particularly in Davenport Schools, a new kind of perfect storm for a good cause, not a disaster.

What Davenport Schools Did


- Looked at current community organizations serving youth
- Sent out an invitation to participate in two days of training to a key member of each of those organizations
- Chose a marketing company who "got it".
- Planned the training for the community committee.
- Worked with the marketing company to come up with a concept and a logo.

MindFire

- Developed a creative brief for the project...
- Helped us understand what would work best in a community campaign.
- Guided us through the process of the development and selection of a logo
- Conducted a community survey to find out what logo was least polarizing and most appealing.
- Designed commercials to air on local cable on MTV, ESPN, CNN, and others and PR campaign with newspaper articles, TV spots, and more
- Designed posters, yard signs, and window clings

What Davenport Schools Did

- Purchased Olweus training materials for the community partners
 - Because of the State Grant...we got some "rollover" funds to use for our initiative.
 - Don't let this deter you...you don't have to have money to do this...but it helps. The community members LOVED getting the materials.

What the Committee Did

In order to get to their organizations trained quickly before the start of the school year **the committee planned:**

- hold four trainings in August, 2011
- various days and various times.
- would provide multiple opportunities for as many staff as possible to attend a two hour training.

What the Committee Did


They decided:

- What their staff needed to know
- How they would get the information
- Where the training would be held
- Training dates and times and length
- The content of the training

What the Committee Did

They agreed their organizations will:

- Train their staff
- Have anti-bullying rules and community logo posted around their buildings.
- Be looking at how to incorporate anti-bullying messages into programming.
- Be working with other community organizations and Davenport Schools to address bullying behavior.
